Introduction

For most Americans, food security—access to enough food for active, healthy living—is assured. Americans consistently enjoy the greatest wealth and most material possessions in the world. But hunger and poverty are growing in homes across the U.S. In 2004, 11 percent of U.S. households (and slightly more in Florida) were food insecure: because of a lack of resources at some time during the year, they had difficulty providing enough food for all family members.¹ The adults in these households are so limited in resources to buy food that they develop coping mechanisms when they run out: reducing the quality or quantity of food their family eats, resorting to using food banks or pantries, and choosing between food and other necessities such as rent, electricity, or medical care.

While household food insecurity has gone down 1.5 percent from 1996 to 2003, Florida is still home to 763,352 food insecure households. Using the state's average of 2.5 individuals per household (Census 2003), it may be determined that there are over 1.9 million Floridians facing food insecurity at some point during the year. These individuals are unable to stretch their incomes to meet the costs of basic necessities.² Though many are above the poverty line, their wages are inadequate. Despite an increase in 2004, Florida's new minimum wage standard of \$6.15 an hour still falls below the \$7.24 needed to reach the federal poverty threshold for a family of two.³ In an economy that is not providing enough year-round, full-time, living-wage jobs, a set of effective public supports for both unemployed and low-income working people and their families is essential.

Utilization of federal programs can ensure that all Floridians, especially children, have access to nutritious foods year-round. A range of nutrition programs is available to help people who struggle with hunger. These programs, however, are vastly underused: in fact, barely half of those eligible for food stamps in Florida receive them. ⁴ According to the Urban Institute, if every eligible family in the U.S. participated fully in existing federal safety net programs, nearly 4 million people could escape poverty.⁵

One important child nutrition program, the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), has the potential to generate dramatic increases in Florida for participation and access for food-insecure children. When the school year ends, more than 1 million low-income children in Florida are left without access to the breakfasts, lunches, and after school snacks they received at school. SFSP has the potential to fill this gap and provide regular meals and snacks at no cost to children (or their communities) who might otherwise go hungry. In Florida, however, of those needy children, only a little over 13 percent eat lunch and 5 percent eat breakfast through participation in SFSP. Consequently there are significant opportunities for expansion that would enable Florida to access more existing federal money to provide nutrition insurance for low-income children. Therefore, this report uses the SFSP as an ideal model for communities that want to aggressively address hunger.

An overview of all the federal food and nutrition programs is provided along with county estimates of household food insecurity, poverty statistics, and information on how well the federal programs are being utilized. We have the resources and the responsibility to end hunger and food insecurity. We entrust this report to you as a first resource in the efforts to secure the necessary response to hunger in your community.

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Summer Nutrition Programs: A Model of Promise and Potential

The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) was established by Congress 37 years ago (1968) to provide meals to children who need them during periods when schools are closed for vacation. It is a federally funded program operated nationally by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and administered in Florida by the Department of Education. During the school year, over 1 million children in Florida are eligible for free or reduced-price school meals. When children do not have continued access to nutritious meals, they return to school in the fall with a nutritional deficit that takes weeks or months to replenish. The summer food program-which can be administered by schools, parks, churches, community centers, and other private, nonprofit organizations--was designed to fill the gap for low-income children who are at risk of losing access to nutritious meals.

Summer meals also serve as the anchor around which summer education, literacy, recreation, and violence prevention activities are built. Recent USDA research shows that 95 percent of SFSP sites provide educational, developmental, or recreational activities in addition to nutritious meals and snacks. SFSP maintains nutritional continuity for hungry children, strengthens public and private non-profit summer programs, and assists the healthy growth and development of low-income children, ensuring they are ready to learn in the new school year.

Though Florida is among the top twenty states using summer food to successfully reach children in need, the SFSP remains severely underutilized. ⁹ The numbers show we have a long way to go from the just under 14 percent of eligible children that participated in the summer of 2004. ¹⁰ The SFSP is not reaching all eligible children because of lack of awareness, a shortage of sites in low-income neighborhoods, and summer food programs that run for only a fraction of the summer months.

In Florida, a handful of communities have improved participation through teamwork and innovation: they have recruited established summer programs as sites, acquired transportation vehicles from churches and other community groups, and partnered with local businesses. Three models in particular demonstrate how summer food programs can reach a maximum number of children.



One program in Taylor County became a nationally recognized SFSP model during its six-year run from 1998 to 2003 because of its outreach efforts to rural communities, for whom transportation is the greatest barrier to SFSP participation. Retired women from the Stewart Memorial AME Church cooked hot meals, while the church offered its van and the cost of gas to make runs to remote rural areas to pick up needy children who otherwise would not have made it to the feeding site. A second program, run by Collier County's Parks and Recreation Department, increased participation from 2,100 lunches in 1984 to 107,000 breakfasts and over 125,000 lunches in 2004 with the help of the school district and local businesses. The school district provides food, employees, kitchen space, and equipment for the assembly of the meals. Local businesses also offer essential resources to the program: for example, a local food vendor provides the meals, a restaurant provides breakfast burritos at half price, and a car rental agency rents vehicles to the program at a discount. The newest model SFSP program began in 2003 in Gulf County. Community members in Port St. Joe recruited a local recreational center to serve as a site upon learning that over a hundred children passed through everyday for basketball and other summer activities. Using volunteer labor, the existing resources of the center, and food

Advancements have also been made at the levels of federal and state policy. First, administrative burdens have been eased by the Seamless Summer Food Waiver (started in 2001 as a federal pilot by Florida and California), which allows public schools to sponsor the SFSP under the provisions of the National School Lunch and School Breakfast programs. This reduces the paperwork burden on public schools while still enabling

donations from community groups, advocates served breakfast to 80 to 100 children daily for three months. 12

smaller, non-school sites to operate under a public school sponsorship. Second, as part of the Child Nutrition and WIC Reauthorization Act of 2004, rural transportation grants are now available from the USDA. The legislation provides a total of \$4 million over three years and stipulates that a maximum of 60 sponsors in up to five states will be awarded these competitive grants. Florida should apply for this three-year grant to promote innovative solutions to the problem of limited transportation in rural areas. Finally, the Children's Summer Nutrition Bill (also known as the "Ms. Willie Ann Glenn Act"), a proposal up for legislation in the 2005 Florida Legislature, ensures that each school district in Florida will sponsor SFSP sites in the neediest areas. Were the Children's Summer Nutrition Bill in effect today: every elementary school in Florida with a low-income (50% or more free or reduced price meal eligibility) student population would have a summer food site within 10 miles; and every county would have at least one site within 5 miles of a low-income school operating for at least 40 days of summer. The bill would boost SFSP participation by improving access to sites for those children who need summer food the most. (See tables in this publication that list amount of federal summer food dollars unused by each county.)

As long as summer food participation remains low, Florida's children are losing access to an important nutritional program, but local communities are also losing federal dollars and the multiplier effect these have on local economies. If every child qualifying for free or reduced-price school meals during the 2003-04 school year were fed one lunch a day for 40 days during the summer (using the 2004 reimbursement rate of \$2.62 per lunch for both the meal and administrative costs), an additional \$106 million in federal funds would enter the Florida economy during one summer. ¹⁴ And this is a conservative estimate since these numbers don't include preschool children and because sponsors can provide up to two meals a day.

Given the need to increase levels of access and participation in SFSP statewide, the availability of funding and resources, and the demonstrated successes of the in-state model programs, we offer the following five recommendations to community and political leaders, school officials, and other federal, state, and local agencies that address the main barriers to a broader utilization of the program.

- Offer SFSP meals at a greater number of convenient sites and increase number of days existing sites are open.
 - The Children's Summer Nutrition Bill would guarantee the growth of the number of SFSP sites as well as the number of days sites are open. More of Florida's eligible children, particularly in areas of concentrated need, will have access to summer food.
- Provide eligible children with transportation to sites.
 - In addition to taking advantage of the opportunity provided by the USDA Rural Transportation Grants, advocates can form partnerships, and thereby pool resources, with private businesses, religious groups, and other organizations to provide the one component not covered by SFSP reimbursement dollars.
- Increase reimbursement rates and include start-up grants.

 A recent FRAC survey found that the low reimbursement rates, in relation to the costs of running the program, often act as barriers to operating the program. Since the 1996 welfare law cut reimbursement rates and ended SFSP start-up grants, program expansion has essentially stopped. ¹⁵
- Encourage school boards to get involved, either as sponsors or sites.

 The involvement of local school boards is crucial in the expansion process, as they have the infrastructure, food service experience, and accessibility to best serve as meal site sponsors. The use of the Seamless Summer Food Waiver can only enhance local school wellness policies, required by Congress in the recent Child Nutrition Reauthorization Act.
- Educate parents, children, and community organizations through outreach and media. In areas where SFSP participation rates are low, lack of awareness of the availability of meals is often a contributing factor. Outreach is necessary to overcome this surmountable but far-reaching barrier. Outreach efforts may include the use of detailed, multilingual SFSP bulletins for school children, annual local news coverage of summer food programs with site listings, and radio and television public service announcements. The establishment of a toll-free SFSP information number would also provide many households with information about how and where to get meals.

The Other Federal Tools for Fighting Hunger

National School Lunch Program

The National School Lunch Program (NSLP) was created by Congress in 1946 as a "measure of national security" when an investigation into the health of young men rejected in the World War II draft showed a connection between physical deficiencies and childhood malnutrition. Now, through the NSLP, all public and non-profit, private schools receive per-meal cash reimbursements, as a federal entitlement, thus providing nutritious meals to the broadest range of American children. Children from low-income families are provided meals at a free or reduced rate depending on their income: those at or below 130 percent of the poverty level are eligible for free meals; those with incomes between 130 percent and 185 percent, for reduced-price meals. School lunch provides school children with one-third or more of their Recommended Dietary Allowance (RDA) for key nutrients; and USDA research indicates that children who participate in this program have superior nutritional intakes compared to

those who do not. Over 28 million children sat down to lunch at school cafeterias across this country in the 2003-04 school year. ¹⁶ And on a typical school day in Florida, two out of every three of the over 1.2 million school children who participate in the NSLP qualify for free-and-reduced price meals. ¹⁷

School Breakfast Program

Most schools have recognized for a long time the benefits of serving lunch to students but have been slower to realize the importance of serving breakfast. Created as a pilot in 1966 and first permanently authorized in 1975, the School Breakfast Program (SBP) offers essential support to



students. Today's long commuting patterns and varied work schedules mean that many children or parents leave home hours before school starts. A good breakfast is vital for these children to be alert and ready to learn. Thanks to the hard work of anti-hunger groups, educators, nutritionists, and child advocates, school breakfast participation has increased to the point where Florida is above the national average in terms of schools participating in the SBP. This is due to the state's mandating of the School Breakfast Program in all elementary schools in 1989. Despite this, of the over 784,135 schoolchildren who participated in free or reduced-price lunch in 2003-04, only 348,608 (less than half) also participated in school breakfast. That means nearly half a million eligible students are not getting these meals. Every child deserves an equal opportunity to succeed in school. Numerous studies document the positive effect school breakfast has on hunger, health and nutrition, classroom behavior, test scores, grades, and school attendance and tardiness. Successful school outcomes are enhanced by increased participation in the School Breakfast Program.

Child and Adult Care Food Program

The USDA's Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) plays a vital role in improving the quality of day care and making it more affordable for many low-income families. Each day, over 149,000 children receive nutritious meals and snacks through Florida's child care centers, Head Start programs, family childcare homes, homeless and domestic violence shelters, and after-school programs. ¹⁹ The Program also provided just under 2 million meals to Floridians who receive care in nonresidential adult daycare centers in FY2004. ²⁰ Independent centers and sponsoring organizations receive cash reimbursements for serving meals that meet federal nutritional guidelines to enrolled children and adults. In Florida, the Child Care portion of the program is administered by the Department of Health while the Department of Elder Affairs handles the Adult Care Food Program. Good nutrition and quality care are essential to the healthy development of preschool children. The CACFP promotes

both—allowing children to develop fully, preparing children to enter school ready to learn, and helping working families work.

Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) is a federally funded preventive nutrition program that provides supplemental foods, nutrition counseling and education, and health care access to low-income pregnant women, new mothers, infants, and children under five at nutritional risk. WIC provides vouchers to buy foods that are rich in protein, iron, calcium, vitamins A and C, and folic acid. These are all key nutrients for the health of women and children that are often lacking in the diets of low-income people. Along with providing the means to obtain these foods, WIC educates mothers about the relationship between nutrition and health. Research continually shows that good nutrition during pregnancy and early childhood has a positive impact on health and development. WIC children enter school ready to learn and have better cognitive performance. In addition, WIC increases birth weight and decreases neonatal deaths and premature infants. ²¹ In Florida, every dollar spent on prenatal care saved the state \$1.77 in Medicaid costs in the first 60 days after birth.²² In fact, for every dollar spent on the prenatal component of the WIC program, there is a savings of \$3.50 over the next 18 years in other costs (hospitalization, outpatient care, and special education). 23 Despite these dramatic results, WIC currently operates with a limited amount of funding, which consequently makes the program unavailable to many who are eligible. Unlike many of the other programs in this report, WIC does not enjoy "entitlement" status; therefore funding levels are rarely enough to meet the needs of all who qualify for benefits.

Food Stamp Program

The Food Stamp Program (FSP) is one of the most important national defenses against hunger. Food stamps provide benefits that can be used to buy food at authorized grocery stores and allow low-income households to obtain a nutritious diet. In addition, the benefits help hardworking people stretch their monthly income by freeing up resources, so families do not have to make choices between buying food or paying rent and utilities, or between feeding their children and getting access to medical care. While helping to combat food insecurity, food stamps can also bring in federal dollars to boost local and state economies. Data from USDA show that each \$5 in federally funded food stamp benefits generates approximately \$10 in economic activity. ²⁴ In 2002 alone, over \$912 million was issued to Florida food stamp recipients. Such a large multiplier effect generates an important economic stimulus to the state's economy.

Sources

Food Insecurity: Since 1995, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has collected information annually on food spending, food access and adequacy, and sources of food assistance for the U.S. population. The information is collected in yearly food security surveys, conducted as a supplement to the nationally representative Current Population Survey (CPS). USDA reports in the Measuring Food Security in the United States series have summarized the findings of this research for each year from 1995 to 2003. Data for 3 years, 2001-03, were combined to provide more reliable statistics at the State level. Florida's food insecurity rate (11.7%, 2001-2003) is reported in this series.

* County Level Food Insecurity Data - The Community Childhood Hunger Identification Project (CCHIP), one of the pioneer studies on hunger in America and forerunner to the USDA food security measure, used race, number of children, family income, and urban/rural residence as predictors of childhood hunger. Of the four, family income measured as a percentage of the poverty level was found to be the single most useful characteristic for predicting whether a family would be hungry or not. Using poverty as a predictor of food insecurity, this report calculates Florida's ratio of food insecurity to poverty based on Census 2000 data, which shows the most current (1999) household poverty data (because household poverty numbers are not estimated in the more current Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates, Florida Impact used Census 2000 data to calculate family food insecurity rates in each county). This ratio was then applied to the Census 2000 household poverty levels for each county to extrapolate a food insecurity rate.

Demographics:

Per capita income – 2000 Census, Table P82. PER CAPITA INCOME IN 1999 (DOLLARS), U.S. Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, www.census.gov. This table from the 2000 Census shows the most recent data on per capita income by state and county level.

Poverty Data - Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (SAIPE), Department of Commerce, Bureau of the Census, 2002. The U.S. Census Bureau, with support from other Federal agencies, created the Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (SAIPE) program to provide more current estimates of selected income and poverty statistics than the most recent decennial census. Unlike the household poverty numbers used to calculate food insecurity in this report, only demographic data for individuals is given in the SAIPE estimates shown here. These estimates are based on statistical models that use decennial census data, household National School Lunch Program (NSLP) during July gives survey data, administrative records data, and population estimates. Since these are statistical estimates they contain

error; that is, the estimates will not be exactly equal to the "true" median income or "true" poverty numbers or rates. Such "true" values are generally impossible to determine.

Unemployment Data - Florida Agency for Workforce Innovation, Labor Market Statistics, 2003 Annual Averages, Local Area Unemployment Statistics Program (850-245-7205), in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, 2004.

Food Stamp Program: Florida Department of Children and Families, Economic Self-Sufficiency Technology Unit. Average monthly participation, number of households, issuance, and benefit per person was calculated for the 2003-2004 fiscal year. The estimated percent of eligible persons participating is based on the number of individuals at 100% of the poverty level according to the Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (SAIPE), 2002. This is a conservative estimate of eligible persons because individuals with gross incomes up to 130% of poverty (among other asset limitations) are potentially eligible.

School Breakfast Program and National School Lunch

Program: Florida Department of Education, Food and Nutrition Management. All data is reported for school year 2003-2004, and do not include any summer program data. County-level average daily participation only includes estimates from public schools; State-level average daily participation includes all providers, public and private. Additional information about the school breakfast program can be found in FRAC's report, School Breakfast Scorecard 2004, available at www.frac.org.

Summer Nutrition Programs: Florida Department of Education, Food and Nutrition Management, Summer Food Service Program (SFSP). Average daily participation numbers are reported for lunch in July 2004 from SFSP sites and SFSP Seamless Waiver sites, and do not include any participation in June or August. Average Daily Summer Food Service attendance is calculated by dividing the total number of lunches served at each site in July by the number of days the site operated. The site averages are combined to produce county average daily participation. Additional children receiving SFSP breakfasts, snacks, or suppers are not captured in this data.

Average combined daily attendance in both SFSP and the a fuller picture of the number of children being fed in the summer. To calculate the number of eligibles served, a rate of attendance as a percentage of the total number of children who qualified for free and reduced-price meals in the 2003-04 school year is given.

** Since this report uses SFSP data in July 2004 only, the average daily participation in counties that operate sites in May, June, or August is not calculated.

Special Supplemental Nutrition Programs for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC): Florida Department of Health, WIC and Nutrition Services. Average monthly participation reflects the average number of women, infants, and children enrolled in WIC in any month in FY 2004. The USDA estimates the number of potentially eligible participants in each county based on live birth statistics, population projections, and the county poverty level.

Callers can be prescreened for Food Stamp Program eligibility and monthly benefit levels via an automated software program developed by Impact. The Help-line is statewide, toll-free, and bi-lingual. Upon a caller's request, prescreening data can be automatically filled into a state Request for Assistance form, printed, and mailed to the applicant. A check-off envelope listing the documentation required for the caseworker interview is sent along with the filled-in application form.

A comprehensive, searchable database of over 1600 local emergency food providers, updated annually, the Directory includes information on client requirements, hours of operation, and types of service offered.
