# The Children's Summer Nutrition Bill: "Ms. Willie Ann Glenn Act."

# **Background:**

When school lets out for the summer, most of the over 1 million school children from Florida's low-income families lose access to the nutrition provided from their school meals. The Summer Food Service Program is a key to filling this gap. It provides meals and snacks to children, who might otherwise go hungry, and is often provided in conjunction with educational, developmental, and recreational activities. Created by Congress in 1968, summer food is a federal entitlement program and can be run by private and public nonprofits.

## **Issue:**

Although the summer food program reimburses both food commodities and administrative costs, the Program serves no more than one out of three children from Florida's low-income families. In fact, there are seven counties in which children have no access to the Program at all. This leaves many at risk of hunger and a \$106-million return on Florida's federal tax dollars sitting on the table in Washington--unused.

Free technical support is available to sponsors through the Florida Department of Education, which can assist county school districts and other public and private nonprofit organizations (including local congregations) with creative ways to develop a summer food program in their communities. Additionally the Seamless Summer Food waiver allows school sponsors to operate the summer nutrition program as if it were an extension of their school lunch program. In one sweep, we could feed more children, import more of our federal tax dollars, and generate a small positive impact on our local communities' summer economies.

## **Solution:**

The Children's Summer Nutrition bill would require each school board to ensure that children of low-income families have access to at least one summer food site in the district that is open for forty days of summer and is within five miles of a school with 50 percent or more free and reduced-price school meal eligibility. It would also ensure additional summer food sites within 10 miles of all elementary schools in low-income areas. The bill provides for an exemption to school boards but requires the issue to be publicly debated and voted out at an annual school board meeting.

Referred committees for the House bill are PreK-12; Future of Florida's Families; Education Appropriations, and Education Council. The Senate bill will travel through the Education, Children and Families, and Education Appropriations committees.

# The Governor's Budget

Washing one's hands of the conflict between the powerful and the powerless means to side with the powerful, not to be neutral.

- Paulo Friere

Running on the principle that, "Fiscal discipline affords the opportunity for a continuing program of tax relief for Floridians," the Governor continues to place tax breaks at the top of his list of priorities in his FY2005-06 state budget of \$61.6 billion. This year he proposes \$285 million in tax exemptions and repeals. Though the annual Sales Tax Holiday on clothing, books, and school supplies (\$35.5 million) and the repeal of the Beverage "By the Drink" tax (\$47.2 million) are included in a handful of largely industry-tied tax breaks,1 none come even close—dollar wise—to the intangibles tax phase out, which represents nearly half (46 percent) of all the Governor's proposed tax relief. And that does not include an additional recurring "savings" of \$294 million in the second year. The phase-out of the intangibles tax is a policy that Governor Bush has pursued since his first year in office and, once completed, would remove 320,000 taxpayers from the rolls--that's a combined two-year total of \$426 million lost to state revenues.

Though the Governor states his concern "to help our most vulnerable and create stronger families and safer communities," the state agency<sup>2</sup> taking the largest hit in budget cuts is the Florida Department of Children and Families (over \$944 million). After adding in Juvenile Justice--another one of the top five losers in the proposed budget-cuts—the Governor has reduced by nearly \$1 billion the budgets of the two departments that, taken together, address the issues confronting the state's most vulnerable families.

Additionally the Governor and Lt.-Governor view Medicaid and the class size amendment as two of three "serious threats to our long

term prosperity"—the other being the repealed high-speed rail amendment. They admit, "While our current financial situation is positive, we still have clouds on the horizon for our long-term fiscal future." And so the question becomes: why then eliminate what amounts to the state's only revenue source from Florida's wealthiest citizens in a state with no income tax, especially since that revenue base would represent such a proportionately small group. It would not be fair to call the intangibles tax "a tax on the elderly," as the Governor did when he formally released his 2005-06 budget. After all, any couple owning up to \$500,000 in intangible assets (i.e., stocks, bonds, money-market funds) would not have to pay the tax. Neither are checking and savings accounts; Individual Retirement Accounts; employee stock options; certificates of deposit; money market accounts through financial institutions; or government bonds subject to this tax. Therefore, a more accurate and unavoidable description of the intangibles tax would be "a tax on the wealthy."

Since 1992, individuals paid no tax on their first \$20,000 of intangible assets, and couples paid no tax on the first \$40,000. There had been no minimum for corporations; but under a law passed in 2001, businesses will not pay on their first \$250,000 in intangible assets, and exemptions will be raised to the first \$250,000 for individuals and the first \$500,000 for couples. Payments are not required if the amount owed is less than \$60. Thus an individual with \$1 million in taxable assets pays \$1,000. These changes were first implemented in 2003.

Upon unveiling his budget with the intangibles tax-cut proposal, Governor Bush

stated, "We've created a business environment that attracts innovation, investments, and jobs." This summarizes the position held by those who believe there is a strong correlation between the creation of jobs and the reduction of the intangibles and other taxes. The idea being that money not given up for taxes will be reinvested by Florida's wealthy into business ventures, real estate, and development—all good for the job market and local economy. But has that happened?

Florida has demonstrated positive overthe-year job growth for almost two years now, leading the nation in the number of new jobs created and the fastest rate of annual job growth among the ten most populous states. But some, like S. V. Date with the Palm Beach Post's Capital Bureau, say that some economists "... liken Bush's taking credit for more jobs in a fast-growing Sunbelt state to a rooster's taking credit for the sunrise." After all, this IS Florida, the nation's fifth fastest growing state since both the beginning and end of the recession. Supply-side economist, Randall Holcombe, from Florida State University, says, "It's not really the cuts that drive job growth but the tax climate. If he (Jeb Bush) had come in and done nothing, Florida had a pretty good tax climate already." Florida's increase in jobs is unarguably related to Florida's overall population growth. And when comparisons are made within that context, job growth in the state failed to keep up with the pace of population growth.3

In fact, despite the \$11 billion in total tax cuts during Jeb Bush's tenure, state employment figures show that the Governor has presided over the lowest job-creation rate of any governor since Reuben Askew (1970), and all those previous governors actually raised taxes.<sup>4</sup>

Finally it is always important to ask, "Which jobs?" Two-fifths of the private-sector jobs Florida gained in 2003 were in fields where the average annual pay was under \$24,297-less than 75 percent of Florida's average annual pay of \$32,397.5 Likewise, going into 2004, "professional and business services" led the super sectors in employment growth over the year. These jobs were largely temporary help and employment placement services. No other sector even approached half the number of jobs generated by this sector although construction jobs grew at the fastest rate. Education and health services and leisure and hospitality came in next; the former represented mainly health care and social assistance while the latter were in food service, hotels, and bars. Florida continued to experience weakness in manufacturing and information sectors—(with average annual pay of \$39,323 and \$46,154, respectively).6

# The Governor's Medicaid Modernization Proposal

Nearly 2 out of 3 (63 percent) of a survey sampling of Florida voters chose health care as one of three of the most important functions of state government-ahead of all others.

### – Mason-Dixon Polling & Research¹

On January 11, 2005, Governor Bush released an outline of a plan to restructure Florida's Medicaid Program. Many of the concepts proposed have not been tested anywhere on a pilot basis, but they strongly resemble President Bush's 2004 Medicaid block grant plan.<sup>2</sup> A Section 1115 waiver will be needed from the federal government to implement much of the proposal; and state waivers are encouraged by the President in the absence of a national Medicaid block grant line item in the 2005 budget (see "Cutting the Butter"— An Analysis of Key Medicaid Provisions" in this issue). Of this writing, there is no information about what the scope of such a waiver would be for Florida or when it will be submitted.

Florida's Medicaid program serves over 2 million people. Over half of those beneficiaries are children--most of whom are covered through federal "mandatory" coverage categories. In general, Florida has few optional beneficiaries and spends less than the national average (per-beneficiary), ranking 39th among states. Though Florida has the largest concentration of seniors in the nation, it also ranks 44<sup>th</sup> on Medicaid spending for the elderly.<sup>3</sup>

# Responses to Selected Points in the Governor's Proposal<sup>4</sup>

"In the transformed Medicaid program, setting the spending level is the primary governmental function."

 Shifting costs to counties, providers, and participants. From this section, it would appear that the Governor's proposal intends to cap the amount of money spent by the Medicaid Program on a per person basis and on an overall or global cap basis as well. If the proposal caps the coverage each enrollee receives, the cost of care will ultimately be shifted back to counties, hospitals, and other safety net providers. Already pinched, these providers will not be able to cover this need, and those who rely on the program are not able to fill gaps.

 Capping state funding will limit federal funding. For every dollar the state spends on health care for the poor through the Medicaid Program, the federal government provides \$1.43. What will the economic impact of the loss of federal dollars mean in terms of lost jobs and business activity? (See "The Multiplier Effect of Medicaid on Florida's Economy.")

"Basic services will include professional services, diagnostic services, hospitalization, and transportation—all of the mandatory services required under federal law and such other services as may be offered by the vendor. However, the amount, duration and scope of services will be determined by each plan or provider-based system, with government oversight to assure that the amount of coverage offered is sufficient to meet patients' medical needs."

• Empowers health plans, not patients. The proposal says it is empowering patients, but in reality there are no guarantees that patients will get the health care they need. It says that the state will provide only "minimum guidance" on the type of and how much health care plans will provide, leaving critical health coverage decisions at the discretion of HMO bureaucrats. HMOs can bail out of providing key services for a variety of reasons, including insufficient profit.

• Leaves rural Floridians in the lurch. The proposal leaves it up to HMOs and other managed care organizations to decide where they want to provide care and to whom. There is no guarantee that health plans will be available in rural areas. Will the state seek the authority through a federal waiver to allow people to receive different benefits based on where they live?

"They (Medicaid participants) will select the type of coverage or the method of accessing services from options offered by managed care organizations (MCOs), insurers, providers, and community-based systems. Additionally, they will have the opportunity to earn enhanced benefits by demonstrating healthy practices and personal responsibility. These enhancements will be provided through flexible spending accounts, which can be used in a variety of ways to purchase additional services or coverage."

- Creates a maze for people to navigate. The proposal lists a complex set of plan choices and options. Some of these options only provide "basic care," others provide "catastrophic coverage" and "enhanced benefits." How will people choose what combination of plans to enroll in? Will the state's information simply steer people into the least costly option?
- Adds more administrative costs. The proposal is so complicated that it requires the establishment of an "information infrastructure" to help people select plans and providers. The state will also determine how much each person can spend on their health care and develop a system to rate plans. The addition of these new procedures will result in significant administrative costs and unnecessary bureaucracy.
- Puts the most vulnerable Floridians at risk. Given that HMOs and other participating private insurers will need to make a profit, the state's desire to control costs, and

the fact that Florida is a low per capita spender already, it seems inevitable that services will be cut. Medicaid was created to provide a safety net for those portions of the population—seniors, disabled, and children—that are most in need of a helping hand. This proposal undermines the security that Medicaid provides by requiring that individuals fend for themselves. With no protections against "cherry-picking" or guarantees of other protections, health plans are free to deny coverage at whim.

"Participants will be allowed to contribute to the cost of their care in order to select and help pay for additional plans or services."

- Cost-sharing. Since the bulk of Florida's Medicaid beneficiaries are children and the vast majority of the rest have very low incomes, research has shown that imposing costs on low-income populations reduces their use of needed services.
- Provides the wrong incentives. The proposal provides incentives for people to forgo enrolling in health coverage now in order to save their Medicaid allotments for the future. What happens if people get sick or need health care now? Also, providing plans with very limited coverage is a very costly mistake. People will avoid getting care in the short-term and end up needing more expensive care in the long term, which will cause health care expenses to increase.
- Fails to address the underlying causes of health-care costs increases. Cost increasesboth in the private market and in Medicaid (which is growing at a slower rate)--are due to factors like the rapidly increasing cost of prescription drugs, hospital care, and the large number of Floridians who have no access to health insurance. The Governor's plan does not appear to address these critical issues.

# The Select Committees on Medicaid —

Both the House Speaker and the Senate President have appointed representatives to select committees and scheduled joint regional public meetings in Tampa, Ft. Lauderdale, Orlando, Panama City, and Jacksonville between mid-February and mid-March. The purpose of these select committees:

- To evaluate the Governor's Medicaid reform plan recommendations;
- To collect public testimony from Medicaid recipients and service providers; and
- To provide recommendations for changes to Florida's Medicaid program.

# The Multiplier Effect of Medicaid on Florida's Economy<sup>5</sup>

- Medicaid dollars flowing into Florida's economy have a "multiplier effect." Thus the aggregate impact of Medicaid spending on the state's economy is greater than the value of the services purchased directly by the Medicaid program. New economic activity generated by Medicaid spending includes new business activity (increased output of goods and services), new jobs and associated wages.
- In fiscal year 2005, Florida will spend approximately 5.5 billion in state funding for its Medicaid program. This investment in Medicaid will generate more than a three fold return in state economic benefit.
- In fiscal year 2005, state Medicaid matching dollars will support 174,000 new jobs, \$6.5 billion in wages and \$16.8 billion in business activity. These jobs will include Medicaid personnel, other employment in the health sector and jobs generated as the Medicaid dollars circulate through different sectors of the economy.

# Funding for Affordable Housing: The Sadowski Coalition Position



The Governor's Office is proposing legislation to cap the distribution to the Housing Trust Funds at \$193 million, beginning July 1, 2006 (FY06-07). The one-year delay is so the money currently going into the trust funds during FY05-06 will be available to spend on hurricane housing. There is no provision mentioned for either a population or cost index. The rationale reflects last year's rhetoric: To maintain trust fund spending at levels consistent with historical expectations while using windfall revenues to fund other priorities.

Of course, \$193 million is not consistent with "historical expectations". The historical expectation has always been that 20 cents of documentary stamp revenue collected on real estate transfers would be distributed into the state and local housing trust funds. That has been the history of the Sadowski Act since its inception in 1992. It wasn't until FY03-04 that we saw state and local housing trust funds diverted to general revenue and used for other purposes.

Moreover, the amount over \$193 million is not a "windfall". The documentary stamp tax was the chosen vehicle for dedicated funding for the state and local housing trust

funds precisely because there is a direct nexus between the increase in the price of real property and the need for subsidy to house Florida's low income workforce, the elderly, and persons with disabilities: as real estate prices increase, the need for subsidy increases, and as real estate prices increase, the documentary stamp collection increases, making additional subsidy available. According to the data collected by the Florida Association of Realtors, the median house price in Florida increased by 71 percent from 2000-2004. During that same period, the average increase in income rose by less than 10 percent. The money generated above \$193 million was intended and is needed for providing affordable housing. Without those dollars, we will house thousands of fewer families year after year.

In his FY05-06 budget, the Governor proposes spending over half a billion (\$547,292,623) for housing and another \$2.9 million from the state housing trust fund for disaster recovery assistance grants. This appropriation level (over \$550 million) equates to "full funding," which is the total amount of funds currently in or projected to be distributed into the Housing Trust Funds through FY05-06. Sixtyfive percent (or \$357.3 million) is for hurricane relief. The Governor is pulling all of these appropriations directly from the housing trust funds for housing or related purposes as intended. The funding for SHIP and SAIL, not targeted for hurricane relief, however, remains stagnant at the \$193 million level, which may perpetuate the notion it is an adequate amount for funding for housing on an ongoing basis. Even without escalating land and construction costs (which have been at record highs), funding at the same rate each year will serve fewer and fewer families. The Florida Legislature is responsible for approving the Governor's budget, and the Sadowski Coalition

is making the following recommendations.

- 1. The Sadowski Coalition supports full funding from the Housing Trust Funds. Full funding for FY05-06 is \$550.5 million. Of that amount, \$375.5 million is the anticipated distributions to the Housing Trust Funds during FY05-06, and the remaining \$175 million is from distribution or anticipated distributions above appropriation levels during FY03-04 and FY04-05. The increase in construction and land costs, which have both skyrocketed in the last 12 months, has severely amplified an already critical situation.
- 2. The Sadowski Coalition supports the prioritization of a portion of the state and local housing trust funds for the counties most impacted by the hurricanes. Prioritizing a portion of the housing Trust Funds for hurricane relief efforts is not inconsistent with the concept of full funding. The Sadowski Coalition suggests \$175 million be prioritized for hurricane housing relief efforts for the 18 most impacted counties, with the remaining \$375.5 million distributed in accordance with the statutory formula. The increase in funding for all jurisdictions recognizes both the need for additional funding due to drastic increases in real estate and construction costs and the fact that the hurricanes have impacted virtually all counties in Florida, as residents in the most severely impacted areas have moved to neighboring jurisdictions; and other funds normally available to rural counties, such as Small Cities CDBG funds, will be available only in the most impacted counties.
- 3. The Sadowski Coalition supports funding for hurricane relief efforts from the Housing Trust Funds. This means that an appropriation is directly from the trust funds to hurricane relief and, to the maximum extent feasible, should utilize existing programs/delivery systems. This will avoid creation of new bureaucracies, reduce need for new oversight mechanisms, and maximize the

percentage of dollars actually spent on housing.

- 4. The Sadowski Coalition supports changes to both the SHIP and SAIL regulations/statutory requirements for hurricane housing funding. Specifically, the SHIP and SAIL Programs are effective and efficient. SHIP provides general guidelines to local governments but allows specific funding decisions to be made at the local level. SAIL is a proven mechanism for production of rental housing for low and very low-income families-- those most impacted by the hurricane. Regulatory changes would allow greater flexibility to local governments in the case of SHIP (other than income restrictions) and higher levels of subsidy (and requirements for extremely low-income family component) in the case of SAIL. These waivers/statutory changes can be made during the legislative session either by proviso language or legislation.
- 5. The Sadowski Coalition supports utilizing the existing Trust Funds mechanism for addressing hurricane housing relief funding. Hurricane relief funding should avoid appropriations outside of this process to specific groups or projects. One of the prime benefits of the Housing Trust Fund system in Florida is that it has created funding mechanisms that eliminate "end runs" around the system by specific interest groups to obtain direct funding for their organization or "special project."

# **The Lifeline Assistance Program**

The Lifeline Assistance Program provides assistance with telephone costs to qualifying low-income households. Recipients of Cash Assistance, Food Stamps, Medicaid, Supplemental Security Insurance, and public housing assistance are eligible to obtain up to \$13.50 in credit toward local monthly bill payments. The federal government provides up to \$10.00, and the telephone company subsidizes the remaining \$3.50. While the Lifeline Program is an effective tool to ensure that all Florida residents have access to an affordable basic telephone connection, many families are unaware of the program. Others that do participate often lose their credit if they fail to make payments on other services.

and the Office of Public Counsel to enter into a memorandum of understanding concerning the automatic enrollment of consumers in Lifeline services:

 Directs a local exchange telecommunications company to offer a consumer who applies for lifeline services the option of blocking all toll calls.

The passage of these bills would be especially helpful to senior citizens that cannot afford a telephone bill but require local service for emergency purposes. Instead of losing local service for failure to make telephone payments, seniors would continue to be able to communicate with health care providers and community resource centers.

## **SB0742**:

- Directs local exchange telecommunications companies to notify company customers of the Lifeline service and eligibility criteria;
- Requires companies to send brochures, pamphlets, or other materials to the customers at least once a year in the customer's monthly billing envelope.

# **Reform of Florida's Sales Tax Exemptions**

Approximately 70,000 fans attended the Super Bowl in Jacksonville. Each bought tickets with an average face value of \$400. What an economic windfall for the state of Florida — right? Not exactly. Had those Super Bowl tickets been subject to Florida's 6 percent sales tax and the local 1 percent charged in Duval County, they would have generated \$2 million or more in tax revenue. But they weren't. The Super Bowl loophole is just one timely example of the Swiss-cheese nature of Florida's tax code. Tickets to regular-season NFL, NBA and major-league baseball games are taxed. But luxury skyboxes at those games are not.

In 2004, the FAIR campaign (Floridians Against Inequities in Rates) was launched to require that the Legislature simply review the state's tax code, which had not been reviewed since 1949. Nearly 300,000 Floridians signed a petition to amend the state Constitution to that effect, but it was knocked off the ballot at the last minute by the state Supreme Court just before the 2004 election because of its wording.

In early February 2005, John McKay, Bob Butterworth, and Bob Milligan announced the kickoff of a new, bipartisan campaign to get Florida to review its outdated tax structure. The FAIR campaign is now collecting signatures for the 2006 ballot. Starting from scratch and with expert legal advice, they have re-written the amendment into three petitions to satisfy the Court's concerns.

## **What are the FAIR amendments?**

- A periodic review of all exemptions— Provides that the Legislature must review every sales tax exemption or exclusion every ten years.
- Requires a public purpose for each exemption – Exemptions or exclusions that are reenacted must have a stated public purpose that does one of the following:
  - encourages economic development and competitiveness

- supports educational, governmental, literary, scientific, religious, or charitable initiatives
- secures tax fairness
- Single subject consideration a must
   Exemptions can only be reenacted in legislative bills as a single subject - no trains with dozens of exemptions!
- Exceptions from the review are provided for food, drugs, health services, residential rent and utilities, sales for resale, sales of real property or stocks and bonds, and employee salaries and benefits.

# The Federal Budget: Cutting spending for the poor as a strategy to reduce the deficit?

Simply put, our nation's fiscal policy is on an unsustainable course. ... over the long term we face a large and growing structural deficit due primarily to known demographic trends, rising health care costs, and relatively low levels of federal revenues as a percent of GDP ... Nothing less than a fundamental reexamination of all major federal spending and tax policies and priorities is needed. This should also involve a national discussion about what Americans want from their government and how much they are willing to pay for those things. This discussion will not be easy, but it must take place because time is working against us.

At a time when 36 million Americans are hungry or at risk, a more aggressive effort to combat hunger and poverty is warranted. Instead the President's budget proposes specific changes to federal food and nutrition policies and budget levels that could potentially weaken those programs vital to the health of many children, seniors, and working poor in America.

The Administration seeks to limit states' ability to get food stamps to low-income, working families with children by eliminating their categorical eligibility status. Categorical eligibility means that a household is considered automatically eligible for one public assistance program based on its eligibility for another public assistance grant, benefit, or service. This eases the process for securing the needed benefits of multiple programs without requiring a family to submit multiple applications. Eligibility for the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Program (TANF) extends categorical eligibility for food stamps even when there's no cash involved, e.g., job training, child care, or other in-kind service. The Administration's proposal would no longer allow states to treat as "categorically eligible" for food stamps those recipients of TANF-

funded services unless they were also receiving cash assistance. Over 10 years, that restriction would cut food stamp spending by approximately \$1 billion-food purchasing power the nation's needy families and local charities are ill-equipped to replace.<sup>1</sup>

- The Administration seeks to cap discretionary program spending--a change that, over time, would adversely affect the capacity of the WIC Program, the Commodity Supplemental Food Program, and Meals on Wheels. The President's budget proposes to fund the WIC program in FY 2006 at \$5.5 billion (FY 2005 funding was \$5.235 billion) to serve an average monthly caseload of 8.5 million WIC participants. This proposed cap on spending for discretionary programs leaves WIC, the Commodity Supplemental Food Program, and other discretionary programs vulnerable to program cuts in the years beyond FY 2006.
- The Administration seeks to eliminate the Community Food and Nutrition Program, which funds community-based services that help needy families obtain nutrition benefits they need. States, public agencies, non-profit groups and Community Action Agencies are eligible to receive funds. CFNP grants help charities build feeding capacity by removing some of the logistical hurdles that prevent food from being donated and/ or fully used. Inasmuch as CFNP funds help leverage on-going donations from the private sector, CFNP grants have a lasting multiplier effect that extends far beyond the program's modest budget.
- The Administration seeks to cut the Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP) by \$3 million--from \$110 million to \$107 million--which translates to a

# **The Federal Budget Timeline**

**First Monday in February:** The President releases his budget proposal.

The President's budget offers program-by-program funding recommendations, along with budget documents and justifications from each administrative agency. The President's submission is not a binding document but the Administration's proposal and request to Congress. It includes spending and revenue projections, usually into the next five years, and can include proposals for tax and entitlement policy changes, with estimated costs or savings.

**April 15th:** Congress completes work on Concurrent Budget Resolution.

Once the President releases his budget, the House and Senate Budget Committees develop their own version of the budget through the budget resolution; this is the committees' sole purpose. They sort out federal spending according to 20 budget functions, like national defense, agriculture, transportation, income security, and so on. Once the Budget Committees adopt their respective budget resolutions, these are sent to the House and Senate floors, where it can be amended by majority vote. It is then sent on to a designated group of House and Senate negotiators or conferees to resolve any differences between the two resolutions

towards a consensus agreement or conference report on the budget. Once passed by both houses, the budget resolution will serve as the blueprint for broad spending and tax decisions to be made during the balance of the year. The final budget resolution is not formally a law; it is a concurrent resolution and does not require the President's signature. But it sets into motion subsequent legislative activity that is submitted to the President and, when enacted, has the force of law. It is through these laws—specifically, appropriations bills—that the congressional budget resolution is implemented.

**October 1st:** Completion of the federal budget.

Once the broad categories of the federal budget are set in the Budget Resolution, these spending allocations are implemented through two processes: appropriations and reconciliation.

The appropriations process for discretionary programs (i.e., programs for which annual approval is required at the "discretion" of Congress, like WIC) involves passing and enacting 13 separate appropriations bills--one for each of the 13 subcommittees of the Appropriations Committee. These must be signed by the President to become law. If all 13 appropriations bills are not enacted by October 1st, the day the new fiscal year begins, Congress may pass a continuing resolution to keep the government running, and this is not unusual. The other set of allocations goes to the various authorizing committees (Agriculture, Commerce, Veterans, Ways and Means, etc.) for entitlements and other mandatory spending. These allocations tell the committees how

caseload drop of 45,000 people. CSFP works to improve the health of low-income pregnant and breastfeeding women, other new mothers up to one year postpartum, infants, children up to age six, and elderly people at least 60 years of age. It does this by supplementing their diets with nutritious USDA commodity foods and provides food and administrative funds to states for this purpose.

# Are human-service programs causing the deficit?

The deficit is projected to be \$4.4 trillion over the next 10 years, assuming the tax cuts enacted since 2001 are kept in place, the Alternative Minimum Tax2 is adjusted, and higher defense spending continues. This comes to \$300 to \$400 billion each year for the next ten years. Domestic spending (unrelated

much in total new budget authority they may spend under the budget resolution. Entitlement spending (like food stamps, Medicare, etc.) is determined by the amount of benefits provided to each qualifying individual for each program. If the authorizing committees make no changes in the authorizing law relative to program eligibility requirements and benefit levels, then the benefits may continue to flow without the need for annual approval. That is why entitlements are said to involve mandatory or direct spending.

From time to time, Congress has chosen to make use of a special procedure known as reconciliation. This procedure was designed originally to facilitate the passage of deficit-reduction legislation, but it has been used twice during the Bush Administration to pass tax-cutting legislation as well. Language known as a "reconciliation directive" must be included in the budget resolution for Congress to use the reconciliation procedure. The directive instructs various committees to produce legislation by a specific date that meets certain spending or tax targets. For example, if welfare programs are expected to spend \$110 billion in the coming fiscal year but the budget resolution calls for limiting them to \$100 billion, then the Ways and Means and other committees with jurisdiction must rewrite parts of the programs to reconcile the actual outcome in spending with what is called for in the budget resolution. This can result in program caps, changes to eligibility criteria that effectively reduces the caseload, etc. The Budget Committees then package all of these bills together and present them on the

floor for an up-or-down vote, with only limited opportunity for amendments. Unlike regular bills, a budget reconciliation bill can take the fast track in the Senate; it is not subject to filibuster and can pass with only 51 votes (not the 60 normally needed to cut off Senate floor debate). So by the time the budget resolution reaches the Appropriations committees, where spending allocations will be made, reconciliation directives have set some definite limits on spending. After the House and Senate resolve the differences between their two bills, a final conference report is voted on the floor of each house and then goes to the President for his signature or veto.6

to homeland security) represented only 9 percent of all the causes of the deficit over the long-term (2002-2011). The rest: 22 percent for Defense, Homeland Security, and International Programs; 32 percent for tax cuts enacted since 2001; and 37 percent for overly optimistic estimates.3

# Where's the money?

Federal revenues are at their lowest share

of the national Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in 45 years, i.e., just over 16 percent in 2004 compared with the 1962-2001 average of 18.3 percent. What changed? A series of bills providing large tax cuts were adopted from 2001 through 2004. This year alone those tax cuts will total \$215 billion. High-income households will reap most of the gains, with the top 20 percent of earners receiving 70 percent of the tax cuts. Roughly \$47 billion of the cuts will go to the top 1 percent--a group

with average incomes of about \$1 million. On top of that, these tax cuts were not paid for. Their costs simply were added to the national debt. Largely as a consequence, the deficit remains quite substantial several years into a recovery. In the absence of the tax cuts, the deficit would be much smaller and the need for cuts in domestic programs much less.<sup>4</sup>

# What's the Plan?

To make all past tax cuts permanent while cutting programs. This proposal will cost more than \$1 trillion over the next 10 years. Over the longer term, the full cost of making the tax cuts permanent is more than three times the size of the long-term shortfall in Social Security.

Still the Administration turns to domestic programs for its deficit relief. There is even interest in altering significantly the Medicaid program -- which provides health insurance for low-income children, parents, and elderly and disabled people -- in a way that would ultimately result in dramatic erosion of the health care coverage or benefits this program provides.<sup>5</sup> It is also not lost on most governors that federal funds paid for nearly 29 percent of

total state government expenditures in FY2003. The Medicare, food stamps, SSI, WIC, housing vouchers, school meals, and the Earned Income Tax Credit are most if not fully funded with federal dollars. And Medicaid, Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), foster care, and adoption assistance programs receive at least half their funding from the federal government. All of these programs in turn produce an economic stimulus into local economies around this country.

# "Cutting the Butter"— An Analysis of Key Medicaid Provisions:

Judd Gregg (R-NH), the new chair of the Senate Budget Committee, is concerned about runaway growth in federal entitlement programs, which pay benefits to millions of American. He says, "This cannot afford to be a guns-and-butter term... You've got to cut the butter."2 But not everyone is towing the party line when it comes to cutting programs like Medicaid. Arkansas Governor Mike Huckabee, a Republican and the vice chair of the National Governors' Association, is concerned particularly about the cuts to the Medicaid Program: "I certainly understand the need to balance the federal budget, but people need to remember that to balance the federal budget off the backs of the poorest people in the country is simply unacceptable. You don't pull feeding tubes from people. You don't pull the wheelchair out from under the child with muscular dystrophy."3

President Bush's fiscal year 2005 budget offers no solutions to our health care crisis, even as the costs of health care climb and more Americans lose their health insurance. From 2000 to 2002, the number of uninsured Americans grew from 39.8 million (14.2 percent of the population) to 43.6 million (15.2 percent). At the same time, both workers and employers have been struggling with dramatic increases in the cost of health insurance: The cost of family policies increased from \$6,300 in 2000 to \$9,100 in 2003. Fewer people are being covered by employer-based health insurance, and the price of prescription drugs continues to rise well above the rate of inflation. In the face of these trends, the President proposes sizable reductions in funding to the states for Medicaid and SCHIP health coverage for the very poorest Americans.

At the same time, President Bush's budget now reveals higher cost estimates for the new Medicare prescription drug law passed last December. The 35 percent jump in cost from \$395 billion to \$534 billion over 10 years is due in great part to the law's failure to leverage any control over rising drug prices and the federal spending required to achieve the Administration's goal of moving more seniors and disabled people into private health plans.

# What Does the Budget Say about Medicaid and State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) Spending?

The Administration's budget proposal reduces net federal funding for Medicaid by nearly \$1 billion in fiscal year 2005 and by nearly \$16 billion over the 10-year period from 2005 to 2014. This cut in federal Medicaid funding will significantly hamper states in their ability to meet the needs of people who rely on Medicaid for critical health care services. Although the budget also includes several initiatives that would help low-income people, these modest improvements are dwarfed by the cuts in funding that the Administration proposes. Following are some key provisions of the President's budget proposal for Medicaid and SCHIP.

• Medicaid and SCHIP Block Grant<sup>4</sup>: The President's budget reaffirms the Administration's commitment to blockgranting Medicaid. While no line item for this proposal is included in the fiscal year 2005 budget, there is strong language stating that the Secretary of Health and Human Services will work with Congress to pass a Medicaid block grant that builds on its fiscal year 2004 proposal. Other information outside of the budget suggests

that the Administration is not going to wait for Congress to move forward. The Administration has aggressively encouraged states to use the Section 1115 waiver process (as Governor Jeb Bush is poised to do) to make significant changes to state Medicaid programs, and these changes are likely to result in capped funding for those state programs (See "The Governor's Medicaid Modernization Proposal" in this issue). This would result in state-by-state block granting without waiting for legislative authority to accomplish this objective on a nationwide basis.

- Temporary State Fiscal Relief: Last year, Congress provided states with \$20 billion in additional federal funds. Of those funds, \$10 billion was provided in grants, and \$10 billion was provided through an increase in the federal share of Medicaid costs for each state. These funds were provided on a temporary basis with the assumption that the state fiscal crisis would be alleviated by this summer. However, the Medicaid budget outlook for fiscal year 2005 remains grim, and states are likely to continue facing significant Medicaid budget shortfalls.5 The President's budget does not include an extension of these temporary funds. Without an extension, it is likely that many states will have to make deep cuts in Medicaid and other social service programs in order to balance their fiscal year 2005 budgets.
- Medicaid "Program Integrity": The budget proposal includes a significant new "waste, fraud, and abuse" initiative that will reduce the federal funds states get for their Medicaid programs by an estimated \$1.5 billion in fiscal year 2005 and by \$23.5 billion over 10 years. The Administration will increase the number and intensity of audits and evaluations of state Medicaid programs. In addition, the Administration would like to reduce the payment limit for certain Medicaid

- providers. The Administration estimates that this initiative, which will make it much more difficult for states to meet the health care needs of their residents, will produce large savings.
- Reduction in *Information Systems Federal Match*: The budget includes a provision that would reduce the federal share of costs related to computer information and claims systems design, development, and implementation from 90 percent to 75 percent. If enacted, this reduction will take effect right at the time that states will be called on to make significant changes to those systems to implement the Medicare prescription drug law. The Administration estimates that this proposal would reduce federal spending by \$80 million in 2005.
- Extension of Expiring SCHIP Funds: The Administration's budget does not extend SCHIP funds that, without such an extension, are likely to expire and revert to the federal Treasury. The Administration estimates that, as a result, \$63 million will expire from the SCHIP program at the end of fiscal year 2005. However, the budget documents fail to mention that an additional estimated \$1.15 billion federal SCHIP funds will expire and revert to the Treasury at the end of fiscal year 2004 if Congress does not act this year. If this happens, nine states will run out of SCHIP funds by the end of fiscal year 2005.
- Extending Expiring Programs: The President's budget does extend two Medicaid provisions that are set to expire this year: 1) Transitional Medical Assistance (TMA), which provides up to 12 months of Medicaid coverage to low-income families who enter the workforce and are no longer eligible for Medicaid; and 2) the Qualified Individual-1 Program, which pays a part of the premium for Medicare beneficiaries with incomes between 120 percent and 135 percent of poverty.

The difference with a Medicaid block grant is that a set amount of funds would be awarded to each state and meaningful federal standards on eligibility, benefits, quality of care, and consumer protections would become more fluid in their state-to-state application.

Section 1115 of the Social Security Act permits the Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) to waive certain portions of the federal Medicaid Act for a five-year demonstration project, if the demonstration is budget neutral to the federal government. Once the budget neutrality test is met, the Secretary, through the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), can grant a state's request to alter Medicaid eligibility standards, benefit rules, payment provisions, and other rules.
